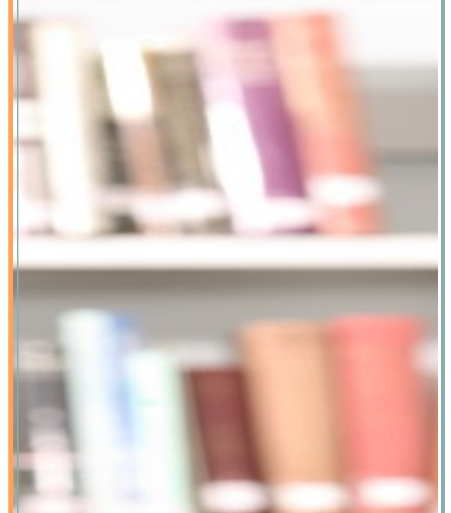
RELAX WITH POPULAR FICTION

Get the facts from **Points of View Reference Center**, available from the Manderino Library homepage: <http://www.library.cup.edu>. *Points of View* presents quality, balanced arguments for and against over 250 current issues. It also has resources to help you critically analyze reading material and develop better essay-writing skills.

The best part is the database is easy-to-use – either type in a search, or simply *View All Topics* to choose yours from the subject list: cloning, standardized testing, Facebook, censorship, and more! Everything is full text online—just click through the tabs to see

- periodicals
- newspapers
- radio/tv transcripts and
- primary source documents!

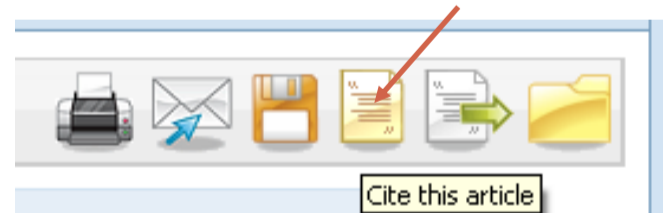
CITATION GENERATORS



APA, MLA, Chicago, Turabian...there's a lot of styles out there that professors might ask you to use when writing papers and creating works cited pages. Here's our favorites.

- Citation Machine : APA, MLA, Chicago and Turabian
- RefWorks : have a lot of sources to manage? Try our most comprehensive tool, with hundreds of styles to choose from. Stop in at the Ref Desk for a tutorial.
- EBSCOhost : you may have heard this name before—databases owned by this company included Academic Search Complete, Points of View Reference Center, Business Source Complete and more.

What you may not know is that all of the EBSCOhost databases can format articles you find through them in any major citation style. Either click on the article on the results list, and then click here



Or, if you have a few articles, you can add them to a folder and then email or print out the citations. We can show you how to at the reference desk.

When using any of these tools, remember to **ALWAYS DOUBLE CHECK!** We have the official handbooks for many styles right behind the reference desk.
