Biography Reference Bank In addition to biographies, you can find links to full-text articles that relate to these individuals, lots of images, and other information.

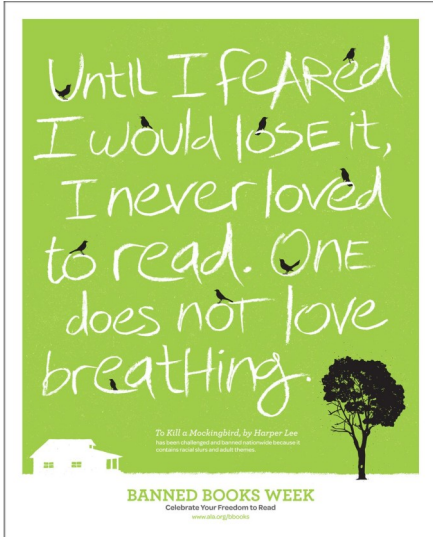
Biography Resource Center Find biographical information on thousands of famous

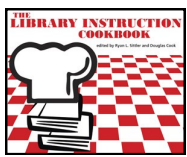
We have lots of other resources to help find biographical information; books through **PILOT**, **E-Z Borrow**, journal articles, and more.
